



Large tumor of the connective tissue (Chondrosarcoma) without growth for four years

A Norwegian patient, born 1959, came to Humlegaarden May 9th 2006 after he was diagnosed beginning of April 2006 with a tumor in the sacrum with considerable destruction of the bone. A biopsy had been taken which showed a highly differentiated chondrosarcoma, i.e. a cancer in the connective tissue with cartilage components. The tumor was 8x11x6 cm, representing a large tumor.

Radiotherapy or chemotherapy could not be offered, and a surgical removal would be a very large and highly dangerous procedure which could cost the patient his life, and which would last for 24 hours.

Apart from light back pain periodically during 10 years, the patient had no symptoms. We started treatment with local hyperthermia and mistletoe compound (Isador P) in increasing dosage, also with Icelandic moss (Cetraria) and Celebrex.

The back pain disappeared in the following months and the patient felt very well.

Around the 10th January 2007, however, he fell down from under the ceiling and hit his back on a concrete floor and was written ill for 14 days. A CT scan now revealed a small progression of the tumor, and again he was advised an operation, being told that he had to stay in bed a full year after the surgery. He refused surgery and early February 2007, the patient again arrives at Humlegaarden and receives local hyperthermia, and we start him on **metronomic chemotherapy with cyclophosphamide 50 mg daily**. Furthermore, we change the mistletoe compound to Helixor A in increasing dosage.

Since his stay here in February 2007, the patient has been scanned numerous times, most recently in January 2010 and each time the result showed no change. His own doctor checks his blood samples every 2 months and the patient continues to feel fine. In 2009 he got a little dryness of his mucous membranes and stopped cyclophosphamide in August 2009.

At our latest contact with the patient on 10/05/2010, **four years after the initial treatment at Humlegaarden**, he is fine and works full time. All the years he has continued with mistletoe 3 x per week and also injections with Cetraria (Icelandic moss), a compound to which anthroposophic medicine ascribe a particular effect on sarcomas.
