Giant Kidney Tumour

Mr. P. E., a farmer, born May 1926, was hospitalised in Southern Jutland on July 27 1989 due to blood in the urine and pain in his left side. As one of his testicles had swollen, the patient underwent surgery on July 28, 1989 as cancer was suspected however, no cancer was detected. On the other hand, an X-ray examination of the kidneys showed a tumor in the left kidney. CT-scanning of the lungs gave rise to a suspicion of central metastases in the right lung and possibly a more peripheral metastases in the right lung.

A CT scan showed a monstrous tumor in the left kidney and suspicion of a growing-in into the vessel stalk on the left side, plus, at the same time, enlarged retroperitoneal glands. The patients large bulge in the groin, consisting of thrombosized vessels, was presumably caused by the growing-in of the tumor into the vessels, and thus the patient was considered inoperable for technical reasons.

There was no possibility of ray treatment nor medical treatment.

From August 24 to September 14 1989 the patient stayed at Humlegaarden and began injections with the mistletoe preparation Helixor A (from spruce) and injections of diluted birch charcoal (Carbo betulae D20), stinging nettle, and rudbeckia among others, and the patient is still following this treatment. The last contact with him was in October 1998 showed that he was doing fine and in good spirits. He can still feel the tumour and has lost weight, but he has resumed working on his farm every day, just like before.
