Recurrent Colon Cancer

A female Danish dentist was operated at age 57 years for cancer in the sigmoid colon in September 1989. The cancer was infiltrating the muscular layer in the colon wall and was the size of an apple (3 x 3 cm.) . A so-called adenocarcinoma, Dukes type B. 20 cm of colon was removed. The patient was well after the operation until March 1991, when she had slight bleeding from the rectum. Two recurrences of the cancer were found: 1) in the rectal wall 23 cm. from the anus (a tumour with a central ulceration); 2) around the opening of the right Fallopian tube a 2 x 1,5 x 1 cm. large metastasis was found. Both metastases were removed the 11th April 1991. Radiation or chemotherapy was recommended, but the patient declined the therapies.

Instead she came to Humlegaarden at the end of April 1991 on a two-week stay and started treatment with the viscum album preparation Iscador McHg and different homeopathic remedies, magnetic field therapy and EichotermSolarium. The tumour marker CEA was at the very upper end of the normal range, but has been normal since then.

In the following years the patient paid several visits to Humlegaarden and continued her viscum album (mistletoe) injections around 4½ years after the last operation.

Our last communication with the patient took place on the 10th June, 2003.

She feels very well and has had no recurrence of her cancer since 1991.

The story demonstrates how effective the viscum album therapy can be in the postoperative treatment on patients with recurrent cancer.
